## CHAIRMAN'S NOTES

These will be the final notes that I write as Chairman of the British Goat Society. It seems incredible to me that ten years have passed by since I became your Chairman in 2002.

On the whole it has been an enjoyable experience. Goodness knows how many miles I have travelled during this time or how many meetings I have attended.

I became Chairman following the horrendous 2001 foot and mouth outbreak. It was a torrid time for us all – particularly those who lost stock or lived in areas where there were outbreaks. My heart went out to every livestock owner. Inevitably, the British Goat Society suffered through a dramatic fall in income and in membership. Fewer goat keepers resulted in fewer registrations and transfers of ownership. Siren voices forecast the certain demise of the British Goat Society “within 5 years”.

I have always been conscious of the possibilities of self fulfilling prophecies and these forecasts served only to redouble my resolve to ensure the British Goat Society recovered and began to look forward once again.

Of course, other obstacles were cast in our way with outbreaks of Johnnes Disease, TB and Blue Tongue. It almost seemed that Mother Nature herself was against us! However, goat keepers are made of stern stuff and it would appear that it was not just the goats who are obstinate, but goat keepers too! Over time the Society would begin to see a small but significant improvement in its fortunes.

A change in Secretary and the relocation of the BGS office from Devon to Northumberland presented yet more challenges, together with the decision to purchase the Grassroots System for registrations.

Now here in 2012 we find ourselves with a much improved financial situation and a steady increase in the number of new members joining the Society. In addition, we shall shortly be the recipient of a substantial legacy which should ensure a more secure future for the Society.

I decided when I first became Chairman of the Society that I would serve a maximum of ten years if my colleagues on the Committee wished me to. I neither wish to get fed up with the role nor sicken others by outstaying my welcome – hence my decision.

I would like to thank the membership of the British Goat Society for their support and encouragement over the years and I shall never forget the letters of encouragement I received when I first became Chairman. I would like to thank the various members of the Committee who served whilst I have been Chairman. I would also record my grateful thanks to all of those Affiliated Societies who hosted Autumn Conferences, AGM's and Affiliated Societies Conferences and, of course, the five Consultation Meetings we held. I would also record my grateful thanks to Sue Knowles and to Jane Wilson for all of their hard work as Secretary and to Sue Daniels who acted as an Assistant to Sue Knowles for many years.

I wish the dear old British Goat Society well in the years ahead and I shall always take a great interest in all that it does. On a very personal note, I would also thank everyone who sent condolences on the recent death of my Mother.

For those of you who don't know us, we are a small pedigree commercial herd based on the North Kent Downs. Our herd name is Shanvern, but we are better known as Ellie's Dairy. We produce and sell unpasteurised milk and a range of cheeses, as well as kid meat in season.

### January 2012

1st Jan, Happy New Year! A quiet start to the year – didn't make it beyond 9.30 last night. Must be getting old. Or boring. Or possibly both! Spent a few hours bottling raw milk and stacking it into our freezers ready for delivery to our wholesaler later in the week then spent the rest of the day doing the VAT return in an effort to get some money back off the taxman!

2nd Jan, Cheesemaking today. The milk is starting to drop off dramatically as many of the goats are drying off ready for kidding so only about 200 litres to work with today. We have almost 100 milkers but only putting about 75 through the parlour at the moment with more disappearing every day.

3rd Jan, Sorted out milk for mail order customers and then braved the elements to deliver our frozen milk to our wholesaler in Sussex. Gale force winds, torrential rain, flooding and trees down all over the place but made it there with only one smashed wing mirror to show for it! Goats stayed firmly indoors today and were not impressed with the rain lashing against the side of the barn. Nice and cosy for them though – just the humans who get soaked to the skin.

Polly limping badly on one of her front feet tonight. Looking rather pathetic, she limped over and dangled her foot in the air as if she wanted someone to take a look at it. Seems to be nothing visibly wrong with it, apart from a small piece of hoof missing on the inside. Probably scraped it on a flint or something and it's just a bit sore. She's a bit of a drama queen though so it was quite a performance getting her through the parlour at milking time. Strangely enough, in true goat fashion, the leg seemed to recover quite well as she spotted a dish full of food.

5th Jan, Morgana, one of the female kids, looked very poorly tonight. Brought her back into the main barn and strawed up a little pen for her. Looks like she is drunk and can't focus or balance. Could be a number of things so dosed her up with B vitamins, antibiotic and anti-inflammatory in the hope that we will still have her in the morning.

6th Jan, Morgana still with us but showing no improvement – having problems eating and we are having to drench her as she can't coordinate drinking by herself. Vet called in to take a look at her. Like us, not convinced that it is CCN or listeriosis but something else. Gave her steroids and more antibiotics. Lots of TLC required.

7th Jan, Wye Farmers Market went OK – bit cold but lots of regular customers buying milk and cheese. Morgana looking a little better but still a long way to go.

11th Jan, Four little male kids down to

the butcher first thing this morning. Poor little chaps. Still, at least they have had happy little lives and will be well appreciated by our customers. Nice sunny day and goaties all out in the field which is nice to see in January!

12th Jan, Chaos in the barn! David did some welding on the gates at the weekend but seems that it wasn't enough. Milkers managed to break gate and everyone escaped into the barn. Utter chaos. But at least they all had fun. And lots of hay. And lots of lucerne. Hopefully noone will need feeding tonight. Morgana was a bit scared by all the big goats running up to her pen and stealing her hay but at least she is up and about and looking a bit more normal. Very shaky on those little legs though.

14th Jan, Very early start – up to Balham Farmers Market in south London. Bit quiet but it is January. All the regulars turned up though so I didn't come home with much – always a good thing! Some of those pregnant girls are getting exceedingly large now .. won't be long before Flora refuses to get up at all. Usually, during her final few weeks she prefers just to blob under a hay rack and has to be hauled to her feet. Poor fat Flora.

17th Jan, Beautiful sunny day again. Can't believe that this weather will last much longer. Most of the goats ventured outside to nibble at the grass and enjoy the sunshine. Goblin looked like she had a sore eye tonight but couldn't see anything obvious (even with my specs on!). Had to put some anaesthetic drops in so we could lift the third eyelid – sure

enough, hay seed stuck underneath. Got it out and put some ointment in. Hopefully it will be much more comfortable now for her. Spent some time chopping large box of fruit from one of my farm shops – goats loved it for their tea tonight!

18th Jan, Busy cheesemaking day. Making cow's brie/camembert for another cheesemaker and starting off one of our own lactic cheeses in the vat. Have to leave it overnight to do its stuff and then scoop it into muslin bags for draining tomorrow afternoon.

19th Jan, Morgana looking much better. Finished course of antibiotics a couple of days ago so we decided to move her back in with the other kids. Bit of fighting going on when she went back but was sure they would settle down. However, when I checked on them later in the day, she was not looking as perky as she had been and looked like she may be starting to wobble again. Brought her back out into her own pen again.

20th Jan, Morgana going downhill rapidly. Spoke with vet and dosed her up again. He thinks it may be some kind of focal abscess on the brain because of the way it is reacting to the antibiotic. Poor little girlie. Lots of cuddles and attention required! Managed to get milking and goats done in reasonable time tonight – the bonus of drying a lot of them off – so called into local pub for drinkie at the end of our milk delivery round. Met up with some friends we hadn't seen for a while, so that was nice to catch up on all the news.

21st Jan Wye Farmers Market again. Took extra milk along for our soapmaker so that she can get some more batches under way for us. Poor David gets the short straw every Saturday as I have markets every single Saturday of the year. I get up especially early to get kids and males fed and hayed and watered so that he can just concentrate on getting the milkers done, otherwise he would be there all morning sorting everyone out. At least Wye is local so it's not the desperately early start. One of my customers brought me some kefir grains along to try. Lots of our customers make it with our raw milk so I thought it was about time I had a go at it myself.

22nd Jan, Trip to Bethersden to visit Chris & Hilary Breakell to pick up a load of hay. We use over 8000 bales a year and didn't have a good crop from a couple of our fields, so need to buy more in while it is still available. Chris makes lovely hay and it's a good excuse to check out Hilary's pygmy goats. Marshview Pygmies are some of the top show goats in the country and have started kidding already. Having never seen a pygmy kid before, I was delighted to see how tiny they are. Beautiful little creatures.

23rd Jan, Another early morning visit to the butcher for little chaps. Only four left to go now – they are the youngest and still need to put on a bit of weight so they have a stay of execution for a short while. Need to get them out of the way before we start kidding again at the end of Feb though. Morgana looking much better today but feel we should keep her

separate for a while until we are certain problem is solved. Looks like it's going to be a long haul for her but she is happy and trotting about. We let her out whenever we are in the barn and she follows us around like a little dog!

25th Jan, Loaded Norville into trailer and took him off to the vet to have his horns taken off. He is one of our stud boys and was disbudded at a few days old. Like most males, his horns have grown back a bit but he has an odd head shape which means that if the horns don't break off, they start to grow backwards and press onto his head. Have noticed recently that he is spending a lot of time rubbing his head against things so I reckon they are starting to get uncomfortable. Peter didn't knock him out completely but gave him a strong sedative which allowed him to get the horns off with a wire and cauterise the bleeding. Poor Norville! Took a little while to come round and still looked dopey when he got back to the farm so gave him his own pen away from the other big males – he lay down and went straight to sleep!

26th Jan, Put Norville back in with the other boys and they all seemed pleased to see him. No fighting like I was expecting! Haven't seen him rubbing his head yet so think the operation has made him much more comfortable. Off to Sussex again with wholesale delivery. And a hairdo for me (my only indulgence every few weeks!)

28/29th Jan, Busy weekend for London markets. Wimbledon and Parson's Green. Both freezing cold but really

good. Made it a very long and tiring weekend though. Always feel guilty leaving David doing the milking but it's no good producing the stuff if you don't sell it!

Got home Sunday evening to find goats had trashed the milking parlour sometime during the afternoon. Someone had managed to open the 'goat proof' gate leading from the barn to the parlour and they had all gone in search of food and adventure. Last thing I needed at the end of a long weekend was to spend a couple of hours clearing up before we could even start milking. Hey ho .. Never a dull moment with goats. I'm sure you don't get as much trouble with sheep. Or camels. Think I might take up a more leisurely business in my next life. like basket weaving or jam making.

31st Jan End of our financial year so have to do a stock take (goats, cows, bottles, cheese etc etc) .. Got all the dairy bills done and sent out as well. Always a bit thin though this time of year as the milk drops.

Morgana is doing well and I think she will make it – just need to keep a close eye on her for a while yet before we can move her back in with the other kids. She is perfectly happy in her little house – she is right next to the male kids who are the same age and she enjoys running around the barn with us. Even follows David into the parlour and trots about while he is doing the milking. Fingers crossed that she will be fine. Only 4 weeks to go until kidding!

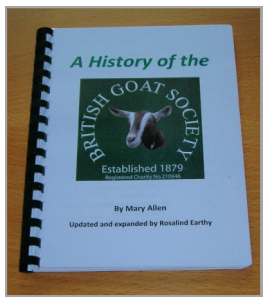
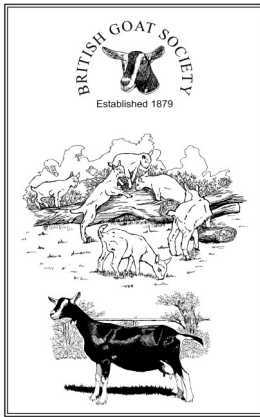

A Chinese farmer is claiming that a goat-riding monkey keeps sneaking onto his land to steal his vegetables.

Ye Shu, of Donguan, Guangdong Province, says the animals are owned by a neighbouring circus. He claims the pair sneak into his field nearly every day, eat a lot of vegetables and damage many others. "This has been going on for two weeks since the acrobatic troupe was first stationed here," he complained.

He says the clever monkey first stands on the goat's back to make sure the coast is clear before launching his raids. "If the monkey sees that nobody is working in the field, he rides in on the goat and they start eating and causing trouble."

A circus spokesman admitted there was nobody to keep an eye on the animals after they had finished their part of the performance.

"We have compensated Ye Shu, and we are sorry for our neglect," said Wu Jun, the troupe leader. Wu said he was now recruiting more animal keepers to prevent the pair from getting out of hand again.

**F**or the record, the international score is currently as follows. For the sake of consistency, only premises with confirmed cases of SBV in calves, lambs, and kids, are included. The table is of PREMISES infected, not of total cases involved.

What we do not know as yet is HOW MANY animals are being infected on the affected farms, and indeed we shall not know that until the lambing, kidding and spring calving seasons have finished. Estimates from Europe currently run from just one animal to 50%, but whether that is 50% of 10 animals or 2000 is not stated.

This is a new virus, and it must be stressed that we cannot be sure how it will behave.

It is ASSUMED that this virus is midge borne, BUT there COULD be other methods of transmission

VACCINATION is not currently possible. It takes a while to develop and test these things. The likelihood of a vaccine becoming available during 2012 is extremely low. There is a possibility of vaccines becoming available during 2013, but we cannot possibly bank on it!!

THE RISK TO HUMAN HEALTH is still considered to be minimal if any, but any ladies who are pregnant are advised in any case to avoid lambing/kidding/calving animals for other reasons.

The biggest unknown is probably that of how many spring calving cows might be infected, either in the UK or elsewhere. That could be difficult to estimate with any real accuracy even in retrospect as it seems likely that calves infected early in pregnancy,

could be born deformed, but by the time they are born, the infection would be undetectable in the calf. A blood test on the dam would be helpful, but is still not yet available

The biggest speculation is over what might happen this time NEXT year. That is something we can only speculate over. It depends entirely on whether there is spread other than by insect vectors, whether the vectors are able to carry virus overwinter at our latitudes, and whether indeed virus can survive in infected animals of any sort from one year to the next.

The nearest comparable virus is Akabane Virus, which is very closely related to SBV and which seems to move forward in fronts as it were. When a “new” area becomes infected, it causes mass abortions, but once it has passed through, animals seem to develop immunity to it through natural infection, and abortions drop to low numbers.

SBV is therefore not necessarily going to be an overall catastrophe, which the Sunday Telegraph headlines as being the farmers’ collective concern, but that is MY personal view. However, as the Sunday Telegraph points out, if you are a farmer struggling with cash flow, and you lose say 30% of your calves, lambs, or indeed kids, then you could be pushed over the financial edge. That I think was good and balanced reporting.

There are many good scientists “On the case”. The rest of us can only wait and see!.

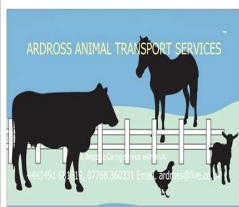

## Electronic Service Certificates

The latest addition to the Grassroots System is the electronic Service Certificate Programme. This addition allows the owners of stud goats to notify the BGS Office electronically of the service of a female.

To notify the Society of a Service, the owner of the Sire needs to:

- Logon on to Grassroots through the BGS website "*Members Online*" using your membership number and password
- Go to the "Manage your Herd" menu
- Select 'Service Certificates'
- Select the sire – this will bring up only the males that you own.
- Search for the female(s) being served which could belong to anyone.
- Enter the date, or date range of the service.
- Print off the A4 service certificate to give to the owner of the female.
- Click "Submit Service Certificate to Society" This is then downloaded into the office system and becomes a mating notice on the file of both the stud goat and the female.

Please note that the booklet type service certificate is still acceptable through the post with registration applications.


Do make sure that when taking a female to a stud goat you receive a Certificate of Service at the time.

## Grassroots Usage

The "Members Online" option to register goats, transfer their ownership and research owners or goats was introduced at the end of May 2010.




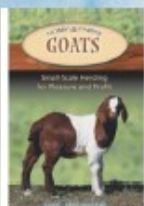
